Federal Advocacy Plan:

The Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act (Perkins V)

 Advance CTE released a new resource identifying ways in which employers can begin to get involved with CTE programs, including through opportunities provided by Perkins V.

Higher Education Act (HEA)

- In October, Advance CTE continued to advocate our priorities for the Fiscal Year 2020
 (FY20) appropriations process and reauthorization of the Higher Education Act (HEA). At
 the end of last month, Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions
 (HELP) Chair Lamar Alexander (R-TN) introduced a package of eight bipartisan bills
 entitled the <u>Student Aid Improvement Act of 2019 (S. 2557)</u>. The proposed package
 includes some of Senator Alexander's priorities for higher education financial aid reform,
 including:
 - Permanently extending funding for many Minority Serving Institutions, which expired at the end of September;
 - Simplifying and streamlining FAFSA submissions;

- Restoring Pell Grant eligibility for those incarcerated; and
- o Expanding Pell Grants to go to some short-term non-degree programs.
- On October 15, House Education and Labor Committee Chair Bobby Scott (D-VA) introduced the Democrat's HEA reauthorization bill, entitled the College Affordability Act (H.R. 4674). The legislation is meant as a comprehensive reauthorization and covers a range of topics, including:
 - Allocating an additional \$181 million to states for postsecondary Perkins CTE programs; additional funds for tribal and outlying areas.
 - Creating a state-federal partnership to fund students to attend community college without cost. This program would require states to contribute \$1 for every \$3 the federal government contributes.
 - Removing the student unit record data system (SURD) ban and creating a new streamlined data system. The language included is almost identical to the <u>College</u> <u>Transparency Act</u> which Advance CTE strongly supports. This would streamline data collection, reduce institutional burden and better track student success and institutional quality.
 - Expanding Pell grant eligible dual-enrollment opportunities through a competitive grant program. The bill would also increase the number of Pell eligible semesters from 12 to 14, which is meant to allay concerns about Pell grant exhaustion.
- From October 29-31, the House Education and Labor Committee held a markup on College Affordability Act. On October 31, the committee voted to approve the bill out of committee, among party lines. A number of CTE-related amendments passed, including:
 - An amendment by Representative Bradley Byrne (R-AL), with a sub-amendment by Representative Andy Levin (D-MI) that would expand access to funds within Title III, including specifically for postsecondary CTE programs;
 - An amendment by Representative Lucy McBath (D-GA) that allowed language in Title IV to include language from WIOA that would include collaboration with industry or sector partnerships;
 - An amendment by Representative GT Thompson (R-PA) with a sub-amendment by Representative Haley Stevens (D-MI) that would include CTE and Perkins alignment to specific Title IV funding for tribal schools; and
 - An amendment by Representative Mark DeSaulnier (D-OR) that would emphasize the recruitment of teachers with "significant cultural and community competency."

State Policy Update

Perkins Implementation Strategy: Advance CTE's Perkins implementation strategy is underway, with many core elements already in place. In October, Advance CTE held the third of three Perkins V Implementation Meeting. 15 states joined this meeting to workshop through Perkins V state planning.

Technical Assistance

- California, New York and Washington have continued to receive coaching from former State Directors in support of Perkins V implementation
- We have been providing topic-specific technical assistance between June 2019-April 2020 to seven states: Florida, Illinois, Minnesota, Ohio, Oregon, Tennessee and Texas. The supports range from supporting stakeholder engagement and state-level coordination to digging into strategies for closing equity gaps and aligning programs of study.
- Oregon: Advance CTE, in partnership with ACTE, continue finished up facilitation of the four workgroups to help inform Oregon's state Perkins V plan development. In the next phase of the work, we will provide feedback to Oregon on its state plan draft documents.
- Iowa: Advance CTE, in partnership with ACTE, have begun providing facilitation and consultation support to the Iowa Department of Education's Bureau of Career and Technical Education, in support of Perkins V implementation. In October, Advance CTE staff facilitated the first of Iowa's State Advisory Council and subgroup meetings and provided consultation to agency staff members. The work will continue through June 2020.

Shared Solutions Workgroups

- Advance CTE's second Shared Solutions Workgroups, focused on middle grades CTE, launched in September. The charge is to identify and develop resources that support the design and implementation of policies, programs and practices that support and expand meaningful CTE/career-focused experiences in grades 5-8.
- The states involved include: Nebraska, Ohio, Tennessee, North Carolina, Delaware, Idaho, Maine, Virginia, Iowa, South Dakota and Utah. National partners include: American School Counselors Association, ACTE, Southern Regional Education Board, National Forum to Accelerate Middle-Grades Reform, Center for American Progress and Education Northwest. We also have two practitioners participating.
- We held an in-person meeting in October in Silver Spring, Maryland. We will be developing a resource that defines what middle grades CTE is and isn't and provides guidance to states developing and evaluating their middle grades policies and programs. We anticipate this being released in late 2019/early 2020.

Other Supports

 Advance CTE's "Expert Peer Review" is well underway, with the first review wave completed in October and the second wave in process. Approximately 40 states will participate in this review process.


Equity Initiative: Advance CTE released the fifth and final equity brief on October 24. The report, titled *Making Good on the Promise: Ensuring Equitable Success through CTE*, examines

state strategies to improve learner success in and completion of high-quality career pathways. Over the next few months,

New Skills for Youth (NSFY) Snapshots and Summary: Advance CTE is in the process of developing the final round of the New Skills for Youth (NSFY) initiative snapshots and summary. Unlike past snapshots, these snapshots will examine states' impact across the entire NSFY initiative, beginning in 2016 with Phase One. The snapshots have been placed in layout and Advance CTE is in the process of writing the summary.


NSFY Innovation Sites: In August, Advance CTE released snapshots on five of these investments located in the United States. This month, we released five additional snapshots on JPMorgan Chase's international sites, along with a summary report that highlights noteworthy, crosscutting strategies from these 10 sites. We will be developing two more snapshots on JPMC's investments in the Washington DC region and Frankfurt, Germany in early 2020. 



Strategies for Attracting Students to High-Quality CTE (Siemens Grant): Staff has continued working with cohort three, which includes four states (AR, GA, IA, and UT). Staff closed out two grantee projects on October 31: AR and GA. UT and IA will end their contracts on November 15. All materials are being collected and audited, to be made available to all states.

Staff has delivered the Career Advising and Development workshop, two of which took place in Delaware and Washington in October. The workshop will be delivered in one state in November. Components of the workshop will be delivered virtually through ASCA's online platform beginning in October and November.

The Workgroup will collectively build resources and tools that help all states advance policies and practices to expand access to high-quality CTE and career advisement for students in the middle grades. Deliverables will be released in the coming weeks and months.

In October, California Governor Gavin Newsom signed <u>SB586</u> into law. The law requires the governing boards of a community college district and school district that provide Career Technical Education (CTE) pathways under the existing College and Career Access Pathways partnerships to consult with local workforce development boards to determine the extent to which the pathways are aligned with regional and statewide employment needs.
