In April, we ultimately joined two organizations – AIR, which is applying for the Strategic Partnerships and Alignment Technical Assistance Center and CSG, which his applying for the Diversity and Inclusion Technical Assistance Center. If awarded, we would receive approximately \$400,000 over four years for either or both proposals. The selected proposals are expected to be announced in June.

Member Engagement & Professional Learning: Advance CTE did not hold formal virtual professional learning events in May following the Spring Meeting; however, members had plenty of opportunities to connect with one another.

Thirteen State Directors representing all five Advance CTE regions and both secondary and postsecondary systems have agreed to join the Vision Kitchen Cabinet to help inform Advance CTE's work and supports in this early phase of the Without Limits vision implementation. The first meeting was held in late May and the Kitchen Cabinet will continue to meet on a monthly basis through early Fall.

The current cohort of the New State Director Institute met for their fourth and final workshop this month. Katie Fitzgerald, Director of Communications & Membership and Stacy Whitehouse, Senior Associate, Communications & State Engagement, co-led a highly interactive session Building and Maximizing Collaboration to encourage State Directors to map their stakeholders and consider how to leverage high-impact partnerships. A formal and comprehensive evaluation of the year-long program's impact is underway; average evaluation scores from the four workshops is presented below.

Priority: Ensure the adoption and implementation of high-quality state and federal CTE POLICY.

Federal Advocacy Update: At the very end of the month, the White House released its Fiscal Year 2022 (FY22) full budget proposal. Differently from prior years, this proposal did not only list requests for the FY22 appropriations bills, but also named requested funding through the American Jobs Plan and American Families Plan. This request calls for a \$20 million increase (only approximately 1.5%) to the Perkins Basic State Grant, as well as a \$108 million increase for National Programs- of which \$100 million would fund competitive awards for middle and high school CTE innovation projects aimed at advancing equity and \$8 million would fund technical assistance and grant evaluations. Given that the education budget was increased by approximately 40% in the proposal, Advance CTE was disappointed by the 1.5% increase for the Basic State Grant. Interestingly, the request also includes a new \$1 billion annually for 10

years to support middle and high school career pathways- this funding would happen separately through the passing of the American Jobs Plan. When the different funding streams come together, the Administration requested essentially doubling the investment in CTE- an encouraging signal of support for the CTE community.

Advance CTE in partnership with the Association for Career and Technical Education (ACTE) released a statement on this proposal, which can be viewed here.

In a shift from previous years and because of the delay in the release of the President's budget, U.S. Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona testified at a House Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies (Labor-HHS-Ed) hearing on the FY22 skinny budget request from the Biden Administration. The hearing also made mention of the American Jobs Plan and American Families Plan. In his opening statement, Secretary Cardona called out the importance of CTE and the need to make higher education affordable and accessible for each student. During this hearing, Representative Josh Harder (D-CA) used his time to discuss the importance of CTE. Secretary Cardona responded by stating the value of giving learners different educational options and making connections to workforce needs. He also brought up the idea of creating a "second shift" at schools- meaning that buildings are kept open beyond the K-12 school hours so that under-employed adults can use the existing space to receive education and workforce training and earn a credential. Representative Harder spoke in support of expanding Pell Grant eligibility to high-quality short-term programs, a view that Advance CTE endorses, and asked the Secretary if he would consider opening Pell or other funding streams. In response, Secretary Cardona said he is open to learning more about this issue because our systems need to evolve to meet the needs of learners. This was a positive response, and signals that the Administration is open to exploring expanded Pell eligibility.

Advance CTE also monitored Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) reauthorization and advocated for CTE priorities within reauthorization. In response to a public request from the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee, Advance CTE submitted recommendations for reauthorization- which included the Board approved WIOA reauthorization recommendations and additional details on where they fit into the law. The House Committee on Education and Labor's Subcommittee on Higher Education and Workforce Investment also held the first two of three hearings on WIOA. The topics covered youth employment and creating employment pathways for dislocated workers. The unintended consequences of the current split of funds between in-school and out-of-school youth was brought up multiple times, including by Subcommittee Chairwoman Frederica Wilson (D-FL). A proposed new strategy for this funding formula is included in Advance CTE's recommendations, and it was encouraging to hear that members of Congress are willing to reconsider the current formula. During the second hearing, we were thrilled to watch Indiana State CTE Director PJ McGrew testify to Congress.

State Policy Update:

Advancing The Framework: Since the beginning of May, Advance CTE and Vivayic have closed the innovation portal used to collect ideas surrounding the National Career Clusters Framework; over 150 participants submitted over 400 ideas that will be used to help generate prototypes of a new framework. Advance CTE hosted the first of two facilitated workshops that brought together 15 national experts to discuss the ideas and future steps of the Advancing the Framework initiative. A second session with a very similar group of experts will be conducted on June 10.

Elevating and Leveraging the Learner Voice in CTE Workgroup: The CTE Learner Voice Shared Solutions Work Group met for the fourth time on May 24th to give input to the draft toolkit that will become the product of this workgroup. Input was gathered from the workgroup to inform the final version. The final meeting of this workgroup will be held June 23rd.

Equity Initiative: Advance CTE's newest equity resource, Brave Dialogues: A Guide to Discussing Racial Equity in Career Technical Education, will be released on Wednesday, June 30, 2021. Accompanying the resource will be a facilitation guide, a virtual "Ask an Expert" webinar, and at least one training workshop to take place later this summer.

Advancing Postsecondary CTE Data Quality Initiative: This month Advance CTE convened the full cohort of states, including the seven un-funded states that are part of the network, for a problem of practice discussion. The discussion focused on the University of the District of Columbia - Community College's efforts to build a data-focused culture among faculty and staff.

JPMC New Skills ready network: This past month, Advance CTE and ESG co-hosted a three-day convening for the six New Skills ready network sites that provided opportunities for cross-site collaboration and learning from experts around data, equity, and communication, among other topics. Advance CTE conducted a pre-conference to help sites build data capacity, focusing on building a high-quality data ecosystem, selecting relevant metrics, and using GIS mapping technology to evaluate access to career pathways. Advance CTE also led a pre-conference around communications and messaging.

Partnership to Advance Youth Apprenticeship (PAYA): This month New America announced six new PAYA grantees: ABQ Partners for Youth Apprenticeship (Albuquerque, NM); Ascend Indiana (Indianapolis, IN); Career Launch Kalamazoo (Kalamazoo, MI); LAUNCH Apprenticeship Network (Riverside County, CA); Southeast Tennessee Works (Chattanooga, TN); and Youth Apprenticeship of Western New York Partnership (Buffalo, NY). These grantees will receive funding and technical assistance to support early-stage design and implementation of programs over 18 months. Separately, Advance CTE convened the PAYA data workgroup and discussed the role of education partners in supporting a high-quality youth apprenticeship data ecosystem.


Publications:

Learning that Works Resource Center: The Resource Center sustained a total of 10,157 hits for the month of May. The top two resources for this month include Advance CTE's Career Clusters Student

Interest Survey, followed by Advance CTE's Practical Guidance for Aligning Career Pathways to Labor Market Data in the Time of COVID-19.

Advance CTE has launched two microsites to support the data policy benchmark tool and the area technical centers resources. This month, the microsite for area technical centers sustained 156 views and the microsite for the data policy benchmark tool sustained 526 views*.





<u>CTE Without Limits:</u> In the past month, another organization signed on (American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences), bringing the total to 41 national organizations supporting *Without Limits: A Shared Vision for the Future of Career Technical Education*. In May, Advance CTE released a <u>session-in-a-box</u> to support members present on the new vision, announced our summer <u>lunch and learn series</u>, which kicks off in June, and hosted our first meeting of a member kitchen cabinet, which is advising Advance CTE on the most needed supports and resources. Work is underway on a blog series, highlighting partners, a repository that elevates major initiatives and investments aligned to the vision and its principles, and a resource to support states' adoption and implementation of the new vision. We are also continuing to engage partners and funders to maintain momentum and make connections across their work and the vision.





View from the Hill

He also highlighted investments in Pell Grants, Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Tribally Controlled Colleges and Universities (TCCUs) and Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs), as well as programs such as TRIO and GEAR UP.

Representative Josh Harder (D-CA) used his time to discuss the importance of CTE. Secretary Cardona responded by stating the value of giving learners different educational options, and making connections to workforce needs. He also brought up the idea of creating a "second shift" at schools- meaning that buildings are kept open beyond the K-12 school hours so that under-employed adults can use the existing space to receive education and workforce training and earn a credential. Representative Harder spoke in support of expanding Pell Grant eligibility to high-quality short-term programs, a view that Advance CTE shares, and asked the Secretary if he would consider opening Pell or other funding streams. In response, Secretary Cardona said he is open to learning more about this issue because our systems need to evolve to meet the needs of learners.

A full budget request from the White House is expected on May 28. Advance CTE will be analyzing what this proposal means for CTE.

Advance CTE also monitored Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) reauthorization and advocated for CTE priorities within reauthorization. In response to a public request from the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee, Advance CTE submitted recommendations for reauthorization. The House Committee on Education and Labor's Subcommittee on Higher Education and Workforce Investment also held the first two of three hearings on WIOA. The topics covered youth employment and creating employment pathways for dislocated workers. The unintended consequences of the current split of funds between in-school and out-of-school youth was brought up multiple times, including by Subcommittee Chairwoman Frederica Wilson (D-FL). A proposed new strategy for this funding formula is included in Advance CTE's recommendations.

Since April 1, over 30 legislative bills connected to CTE have been passed into law. Here are some highlights from the past six weeks:

- Tennessee Public Chapter 271 directs the Tennessee Department of Education to prepare middle school learners for CTE pathways through career exploration opportunities that allow learners to explore high-skill, high-wage, or in-demand careers (enacted May 5, 2021; effective immediately).
- Washington SB5194 requires all community and technical colleges to create and submit strategic plans for achieving diversity, equity, and inclusion of all races on campus using an inclusive process of stakeholder engagement. The law also requires community and technical colleges to develop opportunities for learners from marginalized communities to form student-based organizations, to establish culturally appropriate recruitment, outreach and support programs, and to develop a model faculty diversity program (enacted May 12, 2021; effective July 25, 2021).
- North Dakota HB1478 provides additional flexibility for alternative curricula, allowing a school board to allow students in grades six through twelve to earn course credit through educational opportunities including work-based learning, pre-apprenticeship, internships, industry certifications, etc. with a sponsoring entity (i.e. a business, for- or non-profit organization, trade association, etc.) (enacted April 20, 2021; effective immediately).
- New Hampshire HB304 establishes a nine-person committee to study and make recommendations for tuition reimbursement and transportation for CTE learners and identify policy and funding strategies to increase access to CTE for all learners (enacted April 26; effective immediately).

35 states are still in session, so we expect to see new legislation enacted over the next month. We are continuing to track introduced legislation, bills in committees, or new laws passed throughout the year.
