- College readiness is more easily defined





What is college and career readiness?



College Ready Career Ready

- Academic, "employability" and technical skills
- •Skills shared by both college **and** career ready but this overlap is insufficient to be fully college **and** career ready.

What is career readiness?



- Ready for entry-level work: understand what it means to be an employee but no specific technical skills
- Ready for entry-level work: including technical skills
- Ready for college/ high school graduation

- Validated by employers
- Resulting in a transportable credential
