

NASDCTEc and NCTEF Board of Directors' Update July 2015

ADMINISTRATIVE/ORGANIZATIONAL:

<u>Overview</u>: We are on target and in the process of closing and finalizing the financials for July 31, 2015. Preparations have begun for the audit; the onsite visit is scheduled for the week of September 21, 2015.

State Dues:

- 31 states have paid their dues up from 20 states in June.
- 15 states have an intent form on file.
- 9 states have not submitted an intent form but we anticipate payment by August 31st if an intent form was not received.

Associate Dues:

- To date we have received 89% of the budgeted dues.
- Reminders and invoices were sent via email on July 16 for those who have not paid their dues. Associate dues are due by July 31st.
- Dues continue to come in strong, additional reminders will be sent out the first week of August.
- We have several new organizational members including Certiport, Precision Exams, National Consortium for Health Science Education, and the National Restaurant Foundation.

We have received several positive responses from the state team concept. Those
members receiving a complimentary membership have stated that it is very generous
and they are grateful to have this opportunity to stay involved with NASDCTEc.

<u>Partnership/Fundraising Updates:</u> As we shared earlier, we are involved in two potential federal proposals, including an Investing in innovation (i3) grant and an Indefinite-delivery Indefinite-quantity (IDIQ) proposal around improving CTE, both through the U.S. Department of Education.

The i3 grant, submitted in early August, is to develop and support 20 *Technology Enabled College and Career Academies* across the country, which will offer competency-based, college-prep curriculum rooted in a career academy setting. Our role would be providing expertise around CTE expectations, including but not limited to the Common Career Technical Core, and supporting the implementation of the career academy National Standards of Practice.

The partners in this effort include: The Successful Practices Network, The Center for Secondary School Redesign, Southern New Hampshire University, Motivis Learning, College & Career Academy Support Network at UC Berkeley, and the UCLA Center X.

The IDIQ will likely be due for submission in late August or early September. We cannot share many details at this point as the RFP was not released as expected in July. Broadly, the IDIQ is to provide a range of support – from research to technical assistance – on key priorities for the Department around CTE, such as career pathways, certificate and registered apprenticeships.

The partners in this effort include: RTI International, Jobs for the Future, National Center for College and Career Transitions, Vivayic, Avar Consulting Inc., and Quality Information Partners.

- **New Hampshire:** Mr. Timothy Carney has been appointed State CTE Director replacing Ms. Lisa Danley effective July 2015.


CAREER CLUSTERS:


<u>Career Clusters® Leadership Pilot:</u> As the yearlong pilot begins to wind down, three subcommittees from the Manufacturing Career Cluster Pilot are busily working to finish the following deliverables:

• <u>Course Sequences:</u> Having finished two of three deliverables, this group is now working on its final product – a case study of Wisconsin's Rigorous Programs of Study grant in manufacturing. This case study is due to be published in late summer or early fall.

- Work-based Learning: Work is continuing on this group's primary deliverable a framework for work-based learning with a focus on secondary education. Once the framework is solidified, further discussions will determine what additional deliverables can and should be created. Some of this work may be completed by NASDCTEc staff after the pilot ends. Already this framework, in its draft form, has been used to position the State Directors favorably with other major national partners such as the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and the National Governors Association.
- Industry-recognized Credentials: This subcommittee is working to update NASDCTEc's credentials list by crosswalking existing state lists, which have been validated by business and industry, with the NASDCTEc list to determine if any credentials are missing and/or out of date. Once this work is completed, the group will determine if additional work can and should be completed. The updated credentials list will be completed by early fall.

COMMUNICATIONS:





Communications Committee: The Communications Committee held their first meeting on July 9, 2015 with 12 participants, representing a total of seven states and three national organization. The meeting had two primary topics: a discussion and strategy session around the NASDCTEc rebrand effort and the refresh of the Career Clusters® products. The committee members provided useful information on both fronts, and a number of participants have agreed to serve on a "sub-committee" to provide more hands-on support as we update the Career Cluster pocket guide, brochures and posters.

MEETINGS:

Future of CTE Summit: As of July 31, we have 95 state CTE leaders registered from 48 states and Guam and Washington D.C.; 38 co-convener staff and members; and 33 invited thought leaders for *The Future of CTE Summit*, for a total of 166 registered participants. Registration is effectively closed as of July 31, although we will allow for a remaining registrations over the next few weeks on a case-by-case basis, per the request of a few State Directors and co-conveners.

The Design Team has begun meeting monthly to plan the agenda, activities and other critical pre-Summit efforts, such as the pre-Summit survey and webinar.

PUBLIC POLICY/LEGISLATIVE:

Legislative Updates:

- The reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) continued to dominate the month of July. Read more about the Senate's work on their proposal to renew the law here via our legislative updates:

- Following ESEA's consideration in the Senate, NASDCTEc's attention has once again turned towards the funding outlook for the Perkins Act in FY 2016 along with increasing Congressional attention on the upcoming reauthorization of the Higher Education Act (HEA). Advocacy Plan:

Budget/Appropriations

 NASDCTEc has been engaged with the several coalition groups focused on the Non-Defense Discretionary (NDD) side of the federal budget— the area where the Perkins Act receives its funding. In order to protect current funding levels and to work towards funding increases for the Perkins Act, NASDCTEc has continued to work with these coalition groups to advocate for an end to sequestration and for parity between defense and non-defense discretionary sequester relief. NASDCTEc has supported and attended several national events in conjunction with this group and has endorsed and supported a nationwide sign-on letter calling for an end to sequestration to be released in August.

Higher Ed

Higher Education Act legislative work has also started ahead of possible fall
consideration of the law. NASDCTEc has supported and endorsed a number of
proposals in the lead up to HEA reauthorization that would expand Title IV financial
aid eligibility to shorter-term CTE programs, ensure access to Pell Grants for dual and
concurrently enrolled secondary students, and strengthen the Pell grant program by
reinstating "year-round" provisions. Smaller bills containing these proposals and more
have been introduced in both Chambers of Congress with the intent of embedding
them into a larger HEA reauthorization proposal later this year.

Perkins-related:

- Several sources have indicated that the Senate would like to begin consideration of Perkins later this year which would likely mean Senate CTE hearings this fall, but probably not a full legislative proposal. However, with a number of "must pass" bills all set to expire beginning in September, along with the need to pass funding legislation for FY 2016 and the impending need to raise the debt ceiling, lawmakers may find themselves otherwise occupied.
- NASDCTEc has been approached by House staff to support the crafting of a Perkins marker bill—a loose legislative outline for the law's renewal—that would be aimed at spurring formal committee action later on in 2015. Work on this bill is ongoing and will be based on the Association's existing legislative recommendations and language staff have written to date.
- NASDCTEc staff are in the process of finalizing a proposal for board consideration that would incorporate a position on Perkins' "Maintenance of Effort" provisions within the Association's formal Perkins recommendations. Currently no formal position has been taken by the Association. Following a survey of the State Director membership in May and June of this year, staff have crafted a proposal that would is reflective of the membership's collective position on the provision which would maintain Perkins' 100% MOE requirement, allow states to reset their MOE 'baseline' at the start of a new Perkins law, and strengthen the waiver application process for states.
- NASDCTEc has continued its advocacy efforts in relation to the U.S. Department of Education's (USDE) so-called "methods of administration" regulations. Staff have continued to meet with Congressional offices in an effort to require USDE to prescribe such methods through the formal regulatory process. Efforts on this issue are still ongoing.

- NASDCTEc continues to engage with a loose coalition of employers and education groups around the reauthorization of the Perkins Act. NASDCTEc has proposed a new, narrower scope for this work, in an effort to garner broader consensus among the group. A revised process for this work, along with a new timeline, is currently being drafted in conjunction with ACTE in an effort to move these efforts forward.
- In conjunction with ACTE, NASDCTEc continues to draft legislative language aligned to its Board-approved Perkins priorities. This draft language is currently undergoing revisions to reflect feedback received from Hill staff and other key stakeholder groups. In particular, revisions are being made to the proposal to more effectively align with WIOA in an effort to proactively address this issue ahead of Perkins reauthorization discussions in Congress. Efforts are also underway to draft language on the National Activities section of Perkins. Conversations are still ongoing with the National Alliance for Partnerships in Equity (NAPE) on a broad-based legislative agreement that could, if agreed to, garner the support of a key equity stakeholder for the removal of Perkins' non-traditional accountability metrics in exchange for strengthened language for state and local interventions for underachieving student subgroups. This work is ongoing.

WIOA

• The USDE and USDOL have requested public comment on proposed templates and data definitions for the law's performance accountability system. NASDCTEc plans to formally respond to this request in conjunction with the Workforce Data Quality Campaign and will keep the membership abreast of its activities on this front.
