As a former human resources executive in the automotive industry, I often tend to have an automotive pathway mindset.

E = Everything


So let's begin the journey. Seven years ago, I made a **DECISION** to become a substitute teacher with Akron Public Schools (APS). This was not the most glamorous position, but I had a passion for helping young people become career-ready. This one decision led to a full-time employment opportunity as a replacement for a retiring Marketing Education and DECA Advisor at North High School.

As I developed a **ROUTINE** for teaching my subject matter on a daily basis along with taking CTE courses at Kent State University, I gained the necessary competencies to be successful in the classroom. Eric Mathews 2015 ACTE New Teacher of the Year Marketing Education Instructor & DECA Advisor North High School Akron, OH By Colette Jenkins

INDEPENDENCE: Seventeen-year-old Devin McVay is very interested in whom will be elected president.

"I believe the president will have a direct impact on what happens to me because I'm joining the Army in June and I will be on active duty," said Devin, an Akron North High School senior who will vote for the first time in November.

Devin was among 15 North High School DECA students who on Wednesday night attended a Republican National Convention watch party at the Holiday Inn in Independence. DECA (Distributive Education Clubs of America) is an international association of high school and college students and teachers that works to prepare students in the areas of marketing, finance, hospitality and management.

The watch party was sponsored by AT&T, a DECA partner. The company will host a similar watch party next week for students in the Philadelphia area, during the Democratic National Convention.

Unlike Devin, her classmate Shyam Dahal isn't as invested in the upcoming election. A native of Nepal, Shyam said because he is not a United States citizen, he will not be voting. But that doesn't mean he hasn't paid attention to the negative rhetoric that has been coming from both sides.

"I really don't have a lot of interest in politics. I'm more interested in computers because I want to be an engineer," said Shyam, an 18-year-old senior at North. "One of the reasons I try not to pay too much attention to politics is because people who are running for office say one thing and then they do something else and they only seem interested in saying bad things about their opponents."

From the vantage point of Shyam, Devin and their classmate Dajanae Holmes, this week's RNC in Cleveland has been more of an opportunity to bash Hillary Clinton and the Democratic party than to focus on the Republican platform and the qualifications of Donald Trump, who has been nominated as the Republican presidential candidate.

Dajanae, 17, said she expects the same thing to happen next week, when the Democrats convene in Philadelphia. Dajanae, also a senior at North, will not be old enough to vote in November.

"This election is kind of irrelevant to me because it's hard to support either candidate with all the bashing going back and forth," Dajanae said. "My vision is to have a campaign where the candidates focus on what they bring to the table and to have a third person running, so that if you don't like the two major candidates, you can support somebody else."

Prior to watching and listening to speakers — including Eric Trump, former Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives Newt Gingrich, and Indiana Gov. Mike Pence, whom Donald Trump has chosen as his vice presidential running mate — the North students and five others from

Cleveland Heights High School, heard from Tom Sutton, a political analyst and Baldwin Wallace University professor.

While explaining the political process and the purpose of the convention, Sutton called this year's election "the fear and loathing election" because many voters have expressed uncertainty about voting for either Trump or Clinton.

"People are saying 'I'm not crazy about this candidate but if this one is elected, the country will crash,' "Sutton said. "There has been negative rhetoric on both sides and it's only going to get worse in states like Ohio because we're a swing state."

North High School marketing instructor and DECA adviser Eric Mathews said the watch party is "an opportunity of a lifetime" for his students to experience the political process.

"They will soon become voters and I think this will give them a better understanding about how the process works. It also gives them a chance to see how the campaigning is going in this election," Mathews said. "At the same time, they are having interactions with mentors who are managers at AT&T. These professionals are validating what I teach and making it more meaningful."

On the corporate side, Tania Thomas, president of Women of AT&T, said the watch party was an opportunity for students to network and find supportive mentors.

"We want these students to know that there are people who care about them and want to see them succeed," said Thomas, who is based in Cleveland and works in the company's engineering department. "This is a great way to educate them about the political process and to inspire them to want to stay in school."

Role model



Akron and Suffield teachers among those honored by President Obama at the White House

Two local teachers joined President Obama on Tuesday at the White House for the National Teacher Appreciation Day ceremony.

Eric Mathews, a marketing teacher at Akron's North High School, and Teresa Cianchetti, a first-grade teacher at Mogadore's Suffield Elementary School, were among the teachers welcomed to the White House by the president, who recognized distinguished teachers from throughout the nation.

Cianchetti, who teaches reading, language arts and math, was named Ohio's 2015 Teacher of the Year by the Council of Chief State Schools Officers. The council sponsors a National Teacher of the Year program that results in a teacher being recognized as teacher of the year for the country.

Jahana Hayes, a history teacher at John F. Kennedy High School in Waterbury, Conn., was honored as the 2016 National Teacher of the Year. Hayes will spend a year on a paid sabbatical, traveling the nation to represent educators and advocate on behalf of teachers.

In a proclamation declaring Tuesday National Teacher Appreciation Day, Obama stated: "America's teachers — from the front lines of our civil rights movement to the front lines of our education system — have helped steer our country's course. ... Let us ensure our educators know how much we value their service in the classroom, how much we appreciate all they do for our students and families and how thankful we are for their contributions to our national progress."

Cianchetti, a 30-year teaching veteran, said she was honored to be among the teachers being recognized by the president. She was the K-12 visual arts teacher for the Field district before becoming a first-grade teacher. She also serves as a resident educator mentor and as an in-service leader, assisting other educators in developing student learning objectives.

As one of the state teachers of the year, Cianchetti was among the group of educators who stood on the dais, behind the president as he spoke about the importance of educators and honored all teachers for their work and dedication.

"It's an amazing feeling and so exciting to be able to meet the president. I'm working hard to do my best and make the people of Ohio proud," Cianchetti said. "Among the biggest honors of all of this is to represent the teachers of Ohio and to ensure that our voice is heard in the national discussion about education. It's quite an honor and a responsibility."

Mathews, who left a corporate career in human resources seven years ago to pursue a teaching career in an urban school district, was named the 2015 New Teacher of the Year by the National Association for Career and Technical Education. The honor is given to a teacher who has been in the classroom for five years or less.

Mathews has been a marketing education instructor and DECA (a career and technical student organization) advisor for Akron schools since 2010.

"I became a teacher as a way to give back, as a way to help develop our youth and make sure they are college and career ready," Mathews said. "I never thought I would have an opportunity to go to the White House and meet President Obama. This is truly an honor and it is an acknowledgment of the quality of students we have in Akron Public Schools and their desire to be prepared for the future."
