This letter is written in reference to the program for dental assisting given at the Central Pennsylvania Institute of Science and Technology in Pennsylvania. I have been helping the ladies and gentlemen with their externship on the mobile dental van that we take to nursing homes in the area for the past 5 years.

The students prepare in the classroom by learning instruments and procedures and go out on the van as early as 2 months into the program. Some of the high school students that have been part of the program for several years already have their radiology certification and can help with the radiographs as we need them. I find that even those that are apprehensive before they do this externship, they know that the patients we see from the nursing homes will most likely not be an example of what they will encounter in a regular dental practice. They are exposed to working with medically compromised patients not just with respect to medications, past surgeries, physical limitations, but also those with mental impairments as Alzheimer's and stroke victims. The students have to be prepared for many types of dental procedures including composites, amalgams, extractions, denture care, and routine cleaning of appliances. They learn how to talk to seniors and are very compassionate with those that are out of their daily routine and have anxiety about dental work.

The program at CPI prepares the students for procedures common in the dental office setting, lab work that is commonly performed, and a professional attitude to cross over to the work place. Most dentists in our area will call Mrs. Tobias for referrals when they are looking for a dental assistant to hire. The CPI program has an excellent reputation in the central Pennsylvania area for graduating capable assistants that can perform above average in an office.


INSTRUMENT CLASSIFICATION

Program Task: Student will use Blacks instrument classification to correctly choose instrument angle for the procedure the doctor will perform.

Program Associated Vocabulary BLACKS FORMULA, CUTTING, NONCUTTING, SHANK, WORKING END, NIB, MONANGLE, BIANGLE

Program Formulas and Procedures

Dental instruments are site specific. Black's formula uses a 3 or 4 numbering system to identify width of blade, degree of angle, length of blade, degree of angle from handle. Students need to be able to recognize the correct instrument and angle doctor will need for different procedures. Learning how to find angles with a protractor and recognizing common angles will help the student with ordering and handing correct instrument in four handed dentistry.





EXAMPLE:

Dr. Jones needs a mandibular extraction forcepts to extract tooth #30, he needs a forceps with a 50 degree angle. Using your protractor measure the angles of the above instument and choose the one with a 50 degree angle.

SOLUTION:

B and C are straight, when using the protractor to measure A and D, D is the forceps with the 50 degree angle. A is a 40 degree angle.








Description: Measure and/or compare angles in degrees (up to 360) (protractor must be provided or drawn)

Two parallel lines cut by a transversal:



Angles 1&4, 2&3, 5&8, 6&7 are vertical angles.

Angles 1&5, 2&6, 3&7, 4&8 are corresponding angles. If lines *m* and *n* are parallel then corresponding angles are congruent, Alternate Interior angles are congruent, and Alternate Exterior angles are congruent.

Vertical angles are always congruent.

Sample Questions:

- 1. If angle 1 = 40°, what is the measure of angle 8? Angle 8 must measure 40°, since <1 and <8 are alternate exterior angles.
- 2. If m < 2 = 3x + 4, and m < 3 = x + 8, solve for x = 3x + 4 = x + 8 (subtract x from both sides) 2x + 4 = 8 (subtract 4 from both sides) 2x = 4 (divide both sides by 2) x = 2

Teacher's Script - Comparing and Contrasting

Hygienists do not carry around a protractor to measure angles, so it is vital that they learn to quickly identify angle measurements through estimation. The fact that the hygienist must identify the exact components of the instrument that make up the angle adds to the complexity of the skill.

Common Mistakes Made By Students

Reading the wrong indicator on the protractor (bottom number versus top number, or vice-versa).


Lab Teacher's Extended Discussion

Pull various dental instruments out and have students measure the angles with protractor. When they have mastered this skill, try to see if they can estimate instrument angles while practicing four handed dentistry chair side.
